

What is AHNA?

The Asylum Hill Neighborhood Association was formed in 1996 to plan and implement neighborhood revitalization strategies.



Map of the Asylum Hill Neighborhood

Asylum Hill is defined as:
 Westerly by the north branch of the Park River.
 Northerly by the railroad tracks south of Homestead Avenue and Walnut Street.
 Easterly by the railroad tracks running to the west of Union Place.
 Southerly by railroad tracks from the corner of Huntley and Walnut Street, to the south of 555 Asylum Avenue, up to the intersection of the railroad tracks and the Park River.

AHNA's mission is to preserve and improve Hartford's Asylum Hill neighborhood through the cooperative efforts of residents and stakeholders, such as businesses, property owners, cultural and non-profit organizations, and religious organizations. These constituents come together as volunteers, working for a common cause: the betterment of Asylum Hill.
