Hartford Public Library Holds Maps for All Event March 1

Feb. 23, 2017 — Hartford Public Library, the ThinkWell Center, and the World Affairs Council of Connecticut, will launch a Maps for All Initiative, Wednesday, March 1, from noon to 1 pm, in the Hartford History Center on the third floor of the Downtown Library at 500 Main St.

The mission is to promote geographic literacy and a greater awareness of global issues. Library visitors will be encouraged to mark the place of their birth on the map with stickers or magnets.

The M4A Initiative was started by educator Louise Loomis, founder of ThinkWell, who noticed a lack of geographic literacy. Loomis, who earned a doctorate in education from the University of Massachusetts, taught critical thinking to hundreds of students and educators, and to employees in the corporate and nonprofit sectors. She is the author of *Nimble Thinking, 10 Ways to Solve Problems, Think Creatively, Form Accurate Judgments, and Make Brilliant Decisions*.

It became affiliated with the World Affairs Council. The partnership allows for providing easel maps and individual maps for attendees at World Affairs events.

World maps will be on display at all branches of Hartford Public Library.

Speakers at the March 1 launch include CEO Bridget Quinn-Carey, Hartford Public Library ; Louise Loomis, ThinkWell Center founder; Meghan Clark Torrey, Executive Director of World Affairs Council Connecticut; and Michael Howser, Hartford Campus Library Director, University of Connecticut.
